Successful completion of the course will be marked by the award of a Bishop's Certificate *in Living Theology Today*.

Venues

Course are available at two venues.

- a Durham City venue, with a residential weekend at Ushaw College, Durham
- Church House, North Shields, with a residential weekend at Shepherds Dene, Riding Mill.

Cost

Whilst the main costs of the course will be met by Lindisfarne Regional Training Partnership, applicants will be charged £55 as a registration fee, and £55 towards the cost of the residential weekend. Lindisfarne RTP invites these costs to be met by the applicant's PCC. All students will be registered by Lindisfarne RTP with the Resources Centres (at Carter House, Durham and at Church House, North Shields). There may be some additional costs for individual purchase of books and learning material but these will be kept to a minimum. All core reading will be available from the Resources Centres.

LIVING THEOLOGY TODAY

AN INTRODUCTORY COURSE IN THEOLOGICAL STUDY



What is the course?

Living Theology Today is an introductory course in theology. It is intended for everyone with an interest in exploring Christian Faith and discipleship. It is also an introduction to study and helps people gain an appreciation of how to read, write and reflect on theology. The course is sponsored by Lindisfarne Regional Training Partnership in the Dioceses of Durham and Newcastle.

Aims of the course

The course should help people grow in faith and discipleship through learning and theological reflection.

The course will help people find out more about Christian discipleship and ministry and what they themselves feel called to.

The course will lay a foundation for more advanced study in theology and ministry.

Who is it for?

The course has been designed for people who want to know more about their faith and feel they need a considered reflection on some of the key issues involved with believing and belonging to the Church. The course is also for those who may be considering some form of ordained or lay ministry in the Dioceses of Durham and Newcastle. The course might suit anyone who has completed the Faith and Life Course and is wondering what to do next, although it is not necessary to have done the Faith and Life Course.

As a programme of learning, the course is designed specifically

- i) to encourage those who feel that a deeper understanding of belief and practice will benefit themselves and their church
- or
- ii) to accompany those who are either considering, or are in the formal process of discerning, a vocation to formal ministry.

Course level

The course is set at 'starter' level, it assumes no previous knowledge of formal theology, but it does assume an interest, commitment and curiosity about a deeper exploration of the Christian faith and a willingness to reflect upon it.

Assessment

Students will be required to submit:

1. One assignment of c2000 words, on one of the topics studied on the course – 40%
2. A portfolio of c2500 words, as a journal of reflection which will demonstrate what has been learned during the course – 60%.

The course and its assessment are designed to encourage the demonstration of effective learning using a range of communication skills.

Course content

Following an introductory day on study skills and approaches to learning relevant to the study of theology, the course sets out some reflection on vocation and the envisioning of faith, discipleship and ministry for the Church today. It goes on to explore foundational study in a number of topics including Scripture, theology, church history, liturgy, aesthetics, ethics, principles of preaching, pastoral care, and mission. The course concludes with further reflections on discipleship for the Church today.

Teaching methods

The teaching methods involve directed input with discussions and workshops over 26 weeks (evenings) of two hours per week, together with two study days (one at the beginning and one at the end) and a residential weekend (approximately at the mid point). The course observes school holidays and half terms.
